pilot during the instability in the Valley in 1987. Despite the fact that her voyage took more than half a decade, she was able to acquire her CPL after completing her pilot training in Texas, USA. She is now 48 years old and an Airbus pilot, and she is an encouragement to all young ladies who aspire to fly high!

## 3. Dr. Nyla Ali Khan-



Dr. Khan is an eminent author and academician who has written four works, the most notable of which is Islam, Women, and Violence in Kashmir: Between Indian and Pakistan, which focuses on the suffering of women in her homeland of Jammu and Kashmir, with a heavy emphasis on political issues and turmoil. Dr. Nyla Khan was the first Kashmiri woman to be appointed to the Oklahoma Commission on the Status of Women's Advisory Council in 2015. She is a Visiting Professor at Rose State College and the

(Are you telling me that I'm not your child because you won't let me join the academy?) Her father consented on the proviso that she could only learn kickboxing if she won gold, which she dutifully fulfilled. She is an expert in Taekwondo and Wushu in addition to kickboxing. She is a happy, outgoing child with a sharp sense of humor, which she uses to overcome her fears.
